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
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It's estimated that Australians throw away more than seven million litres of unused paint every year – and until recently much of it was ending up in landfill.

In 2016, the Paintback recycling program was created and a levy of 15 cents per litre on eligible products was introduced. While Dulux, Haymes Paint, PPG, Resene and The Sherwin-Williams Company were founding members of Paintback, 26 paint manufacturers and importers in Australia are now supporting the initiative.

The response has been positive and in its first year, with more than 50 collection stations around the country, Paintback was able to divert over four million kilograms of paint and packaging from landfill to recycling.

HERE'S HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS:





DIY and trade painters take their unwanted paint and packaging to a Paintback site. Paintback accepts up to 100L per visit stowed in containers of up to 20L.

The unwanted paint and packaging is stored at the collection point ready for Paintback to pick up.

The containers are recycled subject to contamination. The solvent paint is used as an alternative energy source. Water is separated from acrylic paint, with the by-product used in a variety of industrial applications, significantly reducing landfill. Paintback's R&D program aims to improve the current resource recovery towards 100 per cent diversion from landfill and movement up the waste hierarchy.

JUDGES KEEPING INDUSTRY STANDARDS HIGH

The Apprentice of the Year competition and the Awards for Excellence are held to acknowledge and support the traditions of the trade as well as encouraging the use of modern techniques and materials.

Each year, a small group of highly skilled tradesmen travel around the State inspecting, grading and choosing the best painting and decorating projects and skills, worthy of recognition and much sought-after awards.

Esteemed judges; David Anderson, Doug Stewart, Steve Mackie, Terry Parsons and Jack Mast collectively represent more than 250 years' experience in the industry and their eye for detail and careful evaluations have contributed immensely to the popularity, quality and esteem enjoyed by the awards today.

According to David Anderson, there are many different categories to be judged with the main areas that apply to most categories being surface preparation, application techniques and degree of difficulty.

"In these areas the contestant has the opportunity to demonstrate their level of skill, application techniques, technical capacity and their passion for the industry."

The meticulous styles of each judge mean contestants need to be diligent in all areas of the trade with individual judges also looking for traits dear to their heart. Terry Parsons looks for cleanliness, no brush or roller marks and straight cutting in. Steve Mackie looks for consistency and attention to detail as well as the contestant being proud to show their work.

Doug Stewart encourages contestants in the Awards for Excellence to take photographs throughout the project to show what was required to achieve the final outcome.

"It's also good to establish during the judging, how much input the contestant had in colour selections and advice."

Doug believes the decision to allow judging by category, where practical, was a good move in terms of ease and consistency on the final judging day.

The judges, most of whom have been judging for more than 20 years, have seen many changes that they believe may present challenges for the trade in the future.

Terry noted the drop in numbers of apprentices and hopes that programs and initiatives aimed at encouraging a swing back to the trades will help create a new generation of young painters and decorators. David sees the rate of new products and skills hitting the market as a challenge for current contractors.

"There's also the time constraints and pressure applied by clients these days, to have contracts completed in an unrealistic timeframe," David said.

Steve Mackie is concerned by a general decline in work standards across the industry, evident since the demise of the Painters Registration Board.

"There's been a downward spiral in work standards mainly due to underpricing by unregistered handymen and painters on low profit margins," Steve said. Doug has seen a positive change amongst some smaller contractors who, upon seeing how thorough the judging is, have stepped up to the mark and improved their work.

"Smaller contractors have learned what's expected at this level of finishing, which has resulted in more of them getting awards. They see the judges doing things like looking at tops and bottoms of doors and mirror frames, checking they've been coated.

"They see our hands are constantly feeling all of the different surfaces for grit or the like, and how involved the process of marking can be. At times it can come down to a quarter or half a point that makes the difference," Doug said.

So what advice do the judges give to apprentices or contractors thinking about entering the awards?

David's advice to apprentices is to have a passion for the industry, learn the many disciplines and skills that make a professional painter and decorator, then join in the competition with other apprentices.

"The competitive environment will not only enhance their skills in the profession, it will build life skills generally."

Terry says it's the perfect launching pad for anyone looking to start their own business with the accolades and the free publicity being the best you can get.

Doug would like to see apprentices having passion and pride in what they do, and not treat painting as 'just a job'.

"Pride will always drive you to strive for better outcomes in whatever you take on in life, and if you don't understand something, don't be backward in asking."

Doug also advises apprentices to do extra curricular skills projects such as colour concepts to help broaden their understanding and prepare them for questions that will be asked.

Doug and Steve join forces in telling apprentices to 'never be afraid of a challenge, don't rush, and do your best!'

For business owners entering the Awards for Excellence, David would like to see enhanced business acumen and increased knowledge of managing the administrative side of running a business.

They all agreed that judging the awards was an honour and despite the additional workload and long distances, there had been many memorable experiences along the way.

Doug recalled, when protocols were stricter than they are today, he managed to get two winning apprentices into the presentation event to see their work recognised and acknowledged, despite them being officially denied an invitation.

Recently, Steve was most impressed while judging contestants from the Great Southern region. He said their work was 'as close to perfect as you will ever see'. Terry will forever remember the trip home from Esperance when car trouble had him doing 35kph all the way back to Perth.

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
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TOP APPRENTICES MAKE THEIR MARK IN 2019

As an MPA Skills apprentice, Jessica did a 15 week pre-apprenticeship with painting trainer Stephen Delaney, who is very proud of his protege.


"Jess was very attentive from the beginning and always keen to learn more," Stephen said.

"I'm proud of Dylan, David and all the other competitors for having the courage to enter the competition and giving it their best shot."

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


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WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

Over the years, hundreds of talented painters and decorators have undertaken apprenticeships through MPA Skills in WA. Recently, Brushstrokes caught up with four of our very deserving success stories.

KRIS PARENTÉ LANDS ON HIS FEET

Sometimes the best apprentice is the one who's tried other jobs before discovering the career prospects and long-term advantages of becoming a painter and decorator.

Kris Parenté was working in a skateboard shop when two of his painter friends introduced him to the trade. Those were days well spent and at 24 years of age, he wasted no time enrolling with MPA Skills.

"I wasn't bothered by the thought of a four-year apprenticeship - I considered it a short time to get prepared for the rest of my life."

Kris was fortunate to do his apprenticeship with Dirk Tander, David Hart and Gavin Vucic. During this time he worked on a broad range of projects and was encouraged to enter the MP&DA Apprentice of the Year (AOTY) competition in 2014 and 2015.

"I enjoyed pitching my skills against the other apprentices – it was friendly competition but we were all in it, one hundred percent, to win," Kris said with a smile.

He rounded off a successful apprenticeship with two silver medals in the AOTY competition.

After graduating in 2015, Kris started his own business and contracted to Spadiccini Homes, one of Australia's top boutique builders specialising in



high quality luxury homes - a contract that still continues today.

"From the start, I wanted to work for myself, to make the decisions about how to do things, take the responsibility - and the credit," he said.

"There's nothing better than seeing a beautiful award-winning home in a glossy magazine and thinking 'I know that house – I painted it!' "

Kris recommends apprentices coming through the ranks should seriously consider entering the AOTY competition.

"Don't be afraid of stepping outside your comfort zone," he said. Give everything a shot."



MICHAEL GALAL SUPPORTS THE FUTURE OF THE INDUSTRY

Michael didn't follow a family tradition, nor did he have painting in his sights as a boy. It was the unsociable hours of his work as a personal trainer that steered him to a career in the trade and ultimately to owning his own business, MG Aussie Painting.

Michael completed his painting qualification in 2009, his Painters Registration in 2011 and started his business in 2012. Since then, he's supported a steady stream of apprentices, passing on what he's learned and giving others the same break he was given. To date, Michael has trained two apprentices to full qualifications – both of whom have now started their own business – and he is currently training another mature-aged apprentice, Cowan Lovell.

Michael's easy-going nature and big smile belie a strong work ethic, keen eye for detail and the desire to provide high quality, professional painting and decorating services to domestic and commercial clients.

He has proved he's an effective mentor and trainer, preferring to always be on hand to keep his apprentices motivated, and to handle any issues straight away.

"Making sure the job's done properly means you don't get called back to fix mistakes. Having to come back to a job is not only a blow to your reputation, it's money out of your pocket, so it pays to do a perfect job first time," Michael said.

Reflecting on his journey, Michael says he's happy with his career choice and how his business is travelling. "I wouldn't change a thing. A four year apprenticeship is the right timing to cover everything you need to know –from preparation and painting techniques to safety measures, including working at heights.

"If you're going to do the job, do it properly, it sets you up for life.

"I'm happy with my small team of two or three painters, we work together and we have a laugh but it is important to choose the right people to work with and to work well together. Painting was a great career change for me, and one I'm happy to recommend," Michael said.

HARD WORK PAYS OFF FOR YOULU ZHAO

Youlu Zhao was a teenager when he migrated to Australia from China and spent his first years learning English and working in hospitality in Sydney. However, following a trek across the Nullabor, he was able to follow his dream to become a painter and decorator.

Since then, Youlu has put in the hard yards completing a four year apprenticeship, followed by further education and training to become registered as a master painter and decorator. He is now fully qualified and has started his own business, Finesse Painting and Decorating.

As a 27 year old apprentice, his goal was to do whatever it took to be the best painter and decorator he could be.

Youlu was employed by MPA Skills, the training arm of Master Painters and Decorators Australia, and hosted by master painters Pretl & Williams whose director Billy McLaren was highly impressed by Youlu's dedication and skill.

"He was an exceptional apprentice who showed initiative right from the start," Billy said.

"It's unusual to keep an apprentice for the full four years but we could see his potential and were happy to put in the time to give him a very broad range of experiences in the industry.

"In return, he showed that he had the ability, confidence and responsibility to complete tasks on his own. We knew he'd get there on time, do a great job and clean up afterwards," Billy said.

MPA Field Officer, onsite assessor and apprentice mentor, Donna Austin says Youlu was a model apprentice and made the most of all the opportunities that came his way.

"His supervisors gave Youlu valuable training in the use of methods and applications that most painters don't see in a lifetime.

"He was even able to apply gold leaf coating during the renovation of the Palace Hotel in the Perth CBD," Donna said.

Youlu has now started his own business and has landed his first major contract. He says being his own boss is a dream come true.

"Painting is not just a job, for me it's a passion".

"At the time, I had my wife and baby girl to support so I did a lot of overtime, working on weekends and any spare time I had. I was lucky to get so much painting experience across all aspects including wallpapering," Youlu said.

"I think in some ways it was better to be a bit older because it was easier to focus on what's important and not waste time."

SHARLENE'S A NATURAL LEADER

Sharlene Kidd was always going to do well. If she'd chosen hairdressing, make-up artistry or mechanics, she would have been outstandingly successful.

While these occupations were once genuine options, it was fortunate for the painting and decorating trade that in 2011 Sharlene chose an apprenticeship with MPASkills.

She loved the 'hands on' teaching methods and thrived in competitions with her peers. She won the Apprentice of the Year locally before achieving amazing results in competitions at national and international levels, including the World Skills finals in Brazil in 2015.

As an apprentice, Sharlene was mentored by the best in the business and understands how influential this support can be in the long term.

During Sharlene's apprenticeship, her leadership qualities were noticed and after graduating she was appointed Supervisor for the company that had hosted her apprenticeship.

Sharlene went on to start her own business, which she combined with a casual role as a trainer at MPA Skills. By 2017, Sharlene had become a full-time trainer of apprentices.

Under her watch, Sharlene's protégés have won gold, silver and bronze in national and international competitions and she's working hard to increase the number and quality of potential apprentices enrolling in training through the Try Trades initiative for years 9 and 10.

"I really enjoy giving back to the trade and being able to mentor others as I was in the beginning.

"I know the great feeling that comes from doing a good job and being acknowledged for it.

"Competition is great for maintaining high standards in the trade and for pushing people to heights they didn't know they were capable of."

"I'd like to pass on everything I've learnt to others coming through, to have better quality painters in the industry and to encourage more females to do any trade they like."



SBDC TAKES OVER BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTION CODE MONITORING UNIT

Early this year, the Minister for Small Business announced a major shake-up in the support and protection of contractors and subcontractors in the

Once adopted, this legislation will provide the Small Business Commissioner with the authority to investigate complaints of non-payment and poor industry practice. It is expected to pass through Parliament before the end of the year.

In the meantime, the Small Business Development Corporation (SBDC) has already taken over the Building and Construction Code Monitoring Unit, previously managed by the Department of Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety - formerly the Department of Commerce.

A major component of the WA Building and Construction Industry Code of Conduct 2016, which the SBDC is now compelled to uphold, is the promotion of fair subcontracting practices and timely payment of subcontractors within the building and construction industry.

Once passed, this initiative will provide an effective, free alternative for contractors and subcontractors affected by unfair practices in the marketplace, particularly in relation to late or non-payment of invoices.

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BE SAFE AT WORK

There are five major hazard areas that occur in the typical workplace of a painter and decorator and should be the focus of any workplace safety inspection. Most of these safety hotspots are also included in WorkSafe WA's key priority areas.



ELECTRICAL

CHEMICAL AND HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCES

NEW AND/OR YOUNG WORKERS



Effectively identifying and managing these hazards is the key to creating a safer workplace. Conducting a risk workshop with your team can also assist in raising potential hazards relating to works. During this risk workshop you can discuss these hazards and develop a risk register, allocating adequate controls, documenting and communicating with your team.

Some controls such as induction documents and competency assessment forms are documentary. Others such as chemical register, material safety data sheets and risk assessments for hazardous

substances are noted in WA legislation as being 'must-haves' in a workplace.

Most construction works require that your business has Safe Work Method Statements (SWMS) in place. These are to be developed in consultation from your workers and signed prior to works taking place.

Young or new workers can represent a potential hazard at workplaces. They may not have the necessary skills, training or experience to conduct their tasks in a safe manner. Competency assessments and undertaking specialised training may be required, along with adequate levels of supervision.

Risks in working at height vary dependent on the equipment being used (ladders, trestles, elevated work platforms). Daily visual inspections of equipment and the removal of any faulty items must be undertaken as a minimum. Plant used on site should have pre-start log books completed and maintenance schedules adhered to.

Electrical equipment used on site has the potential to cause harm if not maintained and visually inspected prior to use. An inspection tagging schedule as detailed in AS/NZS 3760 is required, along with an electrical register kept at the workplace.

IF YOU PAINT OUTDOORS, YOU HAVE A 5 TO 10 TIMES HIGHER RISK OF SKIN CANCER THAN INDOOR WORKERS.

Ultraviolet radiation (UV) can be sneaky. You can't see or feel it, and it's different to heat - that's why UV levels can still be high even on cooler days. It can also reflect off surfaces and penetrate water. Studies show that only a small fraction (9%) of outdoor workers protect themselves fully from UV radiation.

The silent killer

Your skin is like a memory bank - it remembers all the sunburns, all the tans and all the times you spent exposed to the sun's UV radiation, without sun protection. Over time, this UV damage can result in premature ageing, eye damage, sunspots, and ultimately, skin cancer.

Ninety-five to 99 percent of skin cancers in Australia are caused by exposure to UV radiation and around 200 melanomas and 34,000 nonmelanoma skin cancers are linked to workplace exposures every year. Melanoma (the most dangerous type of skin cancer) will kill around 1,725 people this year.

Prevention is easier than you may think

Skin cancer is one of the most preventable types of cancer. Before you start thinking 'the damage has already been done', keep in mind that it's never too late to start protecting your skin to prevent further damage.

Regardless of the temperature or the UV level, outdoor workers should be using sun protection whenever they are outside, all year round. The best way to protect yourself is by using a combination of measures. That means slipping on sun-protective clothing, slopping on SPF 30 or higher sunscreen, slapping on a broad-brimmed hat, seeking shade and wearing sunglasses.

Did you know?

You can claim the cost of sunglasses, hats and sunscreen as a tax deduction. This is because wearing sun protective clothing, sunglasses, sunscreen and hats is no different from wearing safety boots, hard hats or gloves to reduce workplace injury. For more information visit the Australian Taxation Office website.

Additionally, State Occupational Health and Safety Acts require employers to provide and maintain safe working environments. Employers must ensure their employees can work safely and without risk to their health - this includes exposure to UV radiation. In turn, employees have a responsibility for their own safety and health and must follow UV protection policies and use sun protective measures provided. Be safe rather than sorry

Be aware, spot the warning signs, and catch skin cancer early. It's important to keep your eves open and know your own skin. Don't just leave your skin check to the once a year checkup with your GP. The sooner you spot something wrong, the better.

CASHFLOW IS KING -**PROTECT YOURS**

Cashflow is king in small business and it's up to you to give your business every chance of success.

It's estimated that almost half of all small and medium sized businesses in Australia have more than \$20,000 tied up in overdue invoices or bad debts, affecting cashflow and stressing business owners.

According to the Australian Small Business and Family Enterprise Ombudsman, small businesses across the country are experiencing cashflow problems with the latest SME Growth Index indicating 7.3 per cent are significantly worse off and 12.3% saying it is worse now than in the previous year.

There are primarily two ways in which painters and decorators can deal with bad or disputed debts. One is to 'roll over', write off the loss and hope you can recover the money on the next job; or set yourself up better from the outset and defend your position in the event of refusal or reduction in payment.

Here are two real life examples of painters who chose different methods of dealing with their cashflow issues. (For privacy reasons, names have been changed.)

Paul was confronted with a problem client who refused to pay part of Paul's invoice on a large project. To make matters worse, Paul fell for the 'lure' of future work on other projects, as consolation for short payment on the current project.

Paul ended up with debts owed on three subsequent projects with little likelihood of recovering any of his losses. When he refused to do any further work without payment, the client engaged an alternative painter to complete the works and threatened to back-charge Paul for the cost.

Peter used to employ the same approach as Paul until he sought the help of a registered adjudicator.

Peter had an adjudication application prepared and lodged for him. It resulted in a decision being handed down which ordered the client to pay a large portion of what Peter was owed, payable within 5 business days of release of the adjudicators decision.

The errant client failed to pay on the adjudicator's directions however, legislation had accounted for such circumstances, allowing Peter to get his decision enforced in Court.

The enforcement process is swift and very powerful, providing applicants with alternative remedies such as winding up a client (if the client is a building company), or sending the bailiff to seize assets as collateral for the debt owed.

So if you have ever been refused payment, received short payment, had delayed payment or been back-charged for things you were not responsible for - or you've previously walked away from chasing payments because you thought it was too hard or too expensive, then perhaps it's time to think again.

David Court, registered adjudicator, works closely with small business owners in dispute resolution and debt negotiations and says there is no reason for small business owners to give up when chasing legitimate claims.


